
DACAAR's emergency response interventions aim at life-saving in early stages of a crisis targeting internally displaced people, returning refugees, and communities affected by conflicts and natural disasters. Over the past years, DACAAR has endeavored to be among the first responders to people affected by shocks across Afghanistan.

DACAAR's early recovery and developmental interventions are aimed at building resilience, enhancing capacity and improving livelihoods for protracted internally displaced people and returning refugees and their vulnerable host communities. We apply a holistic and integrated approach to our interventions with an emphasis on sustainability and real and positive changes for our beneficiaries. We consider our beneficiaries as the most important stakeholders and the main drivers of our interventions.

While maintaining our Danish roots, we are deeply embedded in the Afghan society and have access and long-term relationships with thousands of communities across all 34 provinces of Afghanistan.





# WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE (WASH)

DACAAR's WASH interventions aim at improving health and quality of life among Afghan communities. Limited access to safe water for drinking and household use, coupled with lack of knowledge of good hygiene practices and unavailability of proper sanitation facilities are major causes of water borne diseases and COVID 19 in Afghan households, resulting in serious illnesses, depletion of scarce household assets, and even mortality among children and other at risk groups.

Over the years 2020 and 2021, we had to continually improve ourselves to meet the growing need for WASH services across the country as active warfare, COVID 19 pandemic and natural disasters caused great suffering and displacement.

We had to exponentially expand our emergency WASH services to cater for the immediately needs of large numbers of IDPs, returnees and host communities affected by conflicts and natural shocks.

Access to remote and hard to reach areas was a major challenge during the period, however, with the perseverance of our staff and unwavering support from our partner communities we were able to reach beneficiaries in all 34 provinces of the country.

The banking crisis and market distortions post August 2021 have negatively affected our ability to ensure timely supply of critical WASH commodities to our projects across the country as such causing some delays in delivery of assistance.

Delivering hygiene messages and kits door to door is a vital component of our WASH interventions to support improvements in health and well-being of Afghan families, particularly women, children, persons with disability and other at-risk persons. Following the takeover of the country by IEA, the door-to-door interventions were banned in some areas affecting our ability to reach these groups, however, this problem was by-in-large resolved later.

Despite the above challenges, DACAAR remained the largest NGO provider of WASH services in the country. Likewise, we remained at the forefront of efforts to improve WASH interventions in the country, by continuing to co-lead the WASH Cluster together with UNICEF, participating in other national and sub-national WASH working groups as well as by conducting regular training seminars on sector best practices at our Water Expertise and Training center (WETC).

# WASH ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2020-2021 (COMBINED):

More than two million affected persons (51% female) were assisted. This included more than four hundred thousend people who received development WASH services and more than 1.6 million who received emergency WASH assistance. The assistance was provided through:

- Construction of 351 tube wells fitted with hand pumps, 263 public/common drinking water stand posts, 5,609 house connection stand posts, and 46 new pipe schemes network.
- Rehabilitation of 1,043 non-functional water points and inspection of 16,665 water points for functionality.
- Distribution of 175,73 million liters of safe drinking water in IDP settlements.
- Distribution of 6,612 emergency bio sand filters for household water treatment.
- Construction of 530 dry vault and pit latrines and 16,887 emergency latrine, bath and hand washing facilities.
- Dissemination of hygiene education messages to 249,973 families and distribution of 211,223 hygiene kits and 5,535 water kits
- Declaring 208 communities Open Defecation Free (ODF) through A-CLTS approach.

#### WATER EXPERTISE AND TRAINING CENTER

The center organized 52 training workshops with the participation of 967 employees of WASH service providers on topics such as drinking water quality testing, well construction, quality guidelines and material specifications, solar-powered water supply, etc. In addition, the center supported DACAAR projects and other WASH providers through its Drinking Water Quality Testing Laboratory. In total the Lab performed 2,849 physical, 2,781 bacteriological and 1,003 chemical tests

#### **GROUNDWATER MONITORING**

Our Groundwater Monitoring Unit carried out the important task of monitoring groundwater quality and quantity, as well as the impact of climate change and overuse on the underground water resources in the country. The unit regularly collected and analyzed data from more than 370 DACAAR established groundwater monitoring wells across 19 provinces of the country. During the two years, 5 new wells were added to the network.

#### THIRD PARTY MONITORING OF WASH PROJECTS

In a partnership with UNICEF, DACAAR performed regular third-party monitoring of water supply and sanitation projects implemented by the Afghan Government and NGO partners in order to help enhance the overall quality of WASH programming at national level. During 2020-2021, DACAAR undertook monitoring visits to 419 projects in 31 provinces. In addition, DACAAR trained 2, 264 (19% women) WASH practitioners, private sector mechanics and community members on operation and maintenance and Water Safety Planning (WSP), while 116 communities were introduced to WSP.

# NATURAL RESOURCES MANAGEMENT (NRM)

In Afghanistan, most of the population is involved in small scale, family-run agricultural and/or livestock farming. In many cases, they produce barely enough to sustain their family needs let alone selling excess produce to make an income. The absence of enough water to sustain farming activities, recurrent droughts, climate change and decades of conflict have dramatically reduced the capacities of the farming families to be self-sufficient.

Our Natural Resources Management (NRM) interventions are aimed at providing sustainable solutions to farmers to increase production and productivity to enable them to not only meet the daily household needs but also to be able to make an income out of selling excess produce.

The above is achieved through a combination of interlinked activities as follows;

- a) Distribution of improved and increased input (seeds, irrigation water, tools, fertilizers, livestock, medicine, etc.),
- b) Season long hands-on training to build farmers' capacity on improved farming techniques,
- c) Follow up support to help farmers deal with farming challenges while they put their newly gain knowledge and skills into practice on their own farms.
- d) Improving access to and community-based management of irrigation water resources for farming by constructing/rehabilitating small-scale irrigation structures.
- e) Supporting farmers on processing, packaging and finding sustainable markets for their produce.

Given the far-reaching consequences of climate change in an already fragile context, DACAAR pays extreme attention to the environmental consequences of its projects, hence the preference for home-based kitchen gardening, small scale farming, traditional grape-drying houses, drip irrigation techniques, drought resistent plants and orchards. In this way, DACAAR can also provide the much-needed aid and support to vulnerable women that might not be in the position to help their families.



# NRM ACHIEVEMENTS DURING 2020-2021 (COMBINED):

6,628 farmers received agriculture, livestock and poultry training and inputs through:

- Construction of 29 greenhouses cultivated with high value vegetables
- Cultivation of 280 open plots of high value vegetables
- Establishment of 449 fruit orchards and vineyards
- Cultivation of 600 plots of cereal crops
- Establishment of one fruit and non-fruit nursery
- Cultivation of 74 plots of saffron
- Construction of two grape-drying houses
- Cultivation of 27 plots with pistachio to promote agroforestry,
- Cultivation of 46 plots with soybean
- Cultivation of 7 plots with asafetida (medicinal herb)
- Improvement of 512 cattle stables and artificial insemination of 900 caws.
- Training of 2,623 farmers on urea molasses mineral block (UMMB), good care practices of livestock, good sanitation hygiene and living practices in livestock farming,
- Training and support to 200 farmers for establishing dairy farms
- Construction/rehabilitation of 99 small scale irrigation structures.

## SMALL SCALE ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT (SSED)

With a growing young population, job creation is among the most important challenges that Afghanistan has to face. Years of conflict, the COVID-19 pandemic, major political changes post August 2021 and ensuing international sanctions have all negatively impacted the economic situation in Afghanistan, worsening an already fragile context.

Over many years, DACAAR has been supporting the Afghan market through training of Afghan youth in various vocations and creation of small and medium enterprises.

DACAAR follows a center-based approach for its vocational training program to maximize peer knowledge and create a familiar environment in which trainees can learn new skills. Training is selected following detailed market assessment to avoid duplication and local market saturation.

Once graduated from the VT centers, the youth are provided with the opportunity to start own or join existing enterprises in the form of vocational shops.

In addition to supporting youth with VT and as a cross-cutting activity between NRM and SSED, DACAAR supports establishment of Producers Associations. These associations enable farmers and producers to harness their collective strength not only in terms of quality and packaging but also in terms of leveraging market linkages to negotiate better prices for their products.

#### SSED ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2020 - 2021 (COMBINED):

A total of 900 small businesses were supported with skills, inputs and business management education by:

- 620 youth (239 women) graduated from DACAAR's vocational training program and received small grants, toolkits and coaching and mentoring for starting own small enterprises.
- 40 retailers receiving incentives to purchase farmer's products.
- 4 Producer Associations involving 240 members (13 % women) were provided with training, small startup grants, tools and mentoring.




# **WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT**

During 2020-2021 DACAAR continued to support rural Afghan women through the previously established Women Resource Centers (WRCs), which are the places where only women can access to create a safe environment to express themselves and participate in tailored activities. In these centers, women participate in collective business development and income generating activities, in addition to taking part in organized training workshops on topics such as bookkeeping, procurement, management, leadership, and business plan development.

The women also have the chance to attend life skills training, literacy courses, safe motherhood, rights awareness training, etc. Literacy courses have been particularly successful as due to conflict and cultural constraints, many Afghan women are left outside of formal education centers, hence they are illiterate and not able to understand numbers, creating more obstacles to their already fragile situation. By helping women to be able to read and write, DACAAR has been contributing to cutting this vicious circle to improve women's position within their families and communities.

Where women cannot attend WRCs due to local cultural constraints, DACAAR female staff train women on kitchen gardening, animal husbandry, tailoring and carpet weaving, directly in their houses.



It is worth mentioning that; DACAAR mainstreams Women's Empowerment across all its sectors of intervention to ensure their voices and needs are heard and met. DACAAR pays specific attention to women's demands both in emergencies situations and long-term development programs. For instance, among the hygiene kits distributed to the needy households, there are specific items that support women's menstrual hygiene. In addition, to enhance safety, DACAAR include torchlight, so IDP women and girls can use it at night time to access sanitation facilities or to fetch water.


Similarly, DACAAR support women in TVET and NRM activities, recognizing their added value in such interventions and the opportunity of supporting their role within the communities and families.

#### WE ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2020 AND 2021 (COMBINED):

A total of 2,342 vulnerable women were supported as follows:

- 120 women graduated from vocational training centers.
- 20 women were organized in one Producer Association.
- 26 women-run greenhouses were constructed.
- 195 dairy cows/ heifers were distributed for vulnerable women headed families.
- 174 women were supported with saffron cultivation, processing and marketing
- 41 women were supported with vegetable production and kitchen gardening.
- 570 women graduated from 9-month long literacy and numeracy classes
- 60 women received with training and inputs for home-based food processing.
- 164 women took part in exposure visits to successful women-run enterprises.
- 20 women received training and inputs for Silvi-Pastoral Activities (Animal+Crops+Fodder).
- 234 women received training and inputs for home-based poultry.
- 340 women received gender and human rights awareness.
- 413 Women from the existing Women's Resource Centers (WRC) received refresher training on basic accounting, procurement, management, leadership, bookkeeping and business planning.
- 22 women were supported for starting and expanding small businesses such as embroidery, tailoring, livestock, pastry, napkin weaving, beauty parlor and shopkeeper.





Maryam Ghulami is graduated from a 7-month tailoring vocational training course implemented by DACAAR. She runs a small tailoring shop in Injil district of Herat province, western Afghanistan where she has just finished sewing a bunch of dresses for a wedding party. The bride's long dress is white and beautiful. Maryam worked hard the past few days to have the dresses ready for the customers well before the party and as per the customers' wishes. Recently she also signed a contract with a private hospital in Herat to sew gowns for nurses and doctors.

"In the VT course, not only did I learn a new skill, but also how to read and write. I have a good income of AFN 300-400 per day which I spend on groceries and fresh foods for my family."







# CITIZENS' CHARTER AFGHANISTAN PROGRAM (CCAP)

DACAAR has been a facilitating partner (FP) to the Ministry of Rural Rehabilitation and Development (MRRD) implementing the CCAP in the three provinces of Laghman, Kunar and Nuristan.

The overall objective of the Citizens' Charter Afghanistan Program (CCAP) was to improve the delivery of core infrastructure and social services to communities by strengthening Community Development Councils (CDCs). The project aimed to increase community engagement and narrow the gap between the government and the communities. The CCAP created mechanisms for citizens to participate in decision making at the community level and to demand improvement of basic services for their communities.

DACAAR was the sole FP for CCAP social services in nine districts of the above three provinces. In 2020-2021 DACAAR provided training to 35,850 persons from 717 CDCs on the following topics: institutional maturity index, establishing and developing market linkages and nutrition.

Furthermore, during 2020-2021 DACAAR supported the MRRD in delivering assistance to communities affected by the economic fallout of COVID19 pandemic delivering food assistance to 1,135 vulnerable households under Afghan Government's REACH and ENETAWF initiatives.

### ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

At the beginning of 2021, DACAAR; through a comprehensive participatory process developed its Strategic Program Framework for 2021-2024, however, later it was decided to park the strategy due to the major political and social changes in Afghanistan following the overthrow of Islamic Republic by the Islamic Emirates of Afghanistan. It is planned to revive the discussions on the Strategic Framework during 2022.

During 2020-2021, DACAAR continued its female internship program admitting 32 young females into a six-month long practical learning program. The aim of the internship program is to improve employability for aspiring female graduates by giving them the opportunities to pair up and work as proteges with experienced DACAAR staff in various departments and to participate in organized training opportunities in DACAAR.

In order to improve support functions to meet the requirements of a dynamic context, while ensuring the utmost levels of accountability and transparency, DACAAR updated its policy and procedure manuals including the HR, Finance, Procurement and Accountability to Affected Populations, PSEA, etc.

A new HR MIS system was developed to help improve HR and payroll information management while the financial information system was migrated to the SUN system from the previous NAVISION system.

Continuous learning and professional development are permanent features of the working environment in DACAAR. A wide range of training opportunities on various topics are conducted every year to help staff remain abreast with the latest trends and technologies in the workplace. During the years 2020 and 2021, 577 staff participated in various training workshops. Topics included; financial management, advance management, report writing, business communication, prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse (PSEA), accountability to affected populations (AAP), NGO security management, agriculture and market value chains, protection mainstreaming, etc.



After joining DACAAR's internship program, my overall skills improved. The program helped me to get familiar with working environment and know how to be effective in society.

I experienced a total professional working environment at DACAAR, where I could scale up my learning potency and increased my self-confidence.

I am sure that I will get good opportunities in the future and use all my skills that I have received in DACAAR.
